DOC is a national non-profit organization which is involved in community activities to promote healthy lifestyles and teach about preventable causes of illness.

"We will have other projects throughout the year," said Elizabeth G. Baxley, M.D. "Our primary focus is on school age children in order to prevent them from developing unhealthy lifestyles before they 'get started."
