

U.S. REPORT REVIEWS Plane Hits Skyscraper, 4 Die **RESEARCH ON HEALTH Bodies Fall Panel of 10 Medical Advisers Tells** 28 Floors in

Surgeon General: Hazard Calls for 'Remedial Action'

BY MICHAEL PAKENHAM [Chicage Tribune Press Service]

Washington, Jan. 11 - The government committee's report on smoking and health, released today, said flatly that cigarets are a direct cause of lung cancer and other fatal diseases, and urged action.

The committee said that there is "simply no evidence that filters [on cigarets] have had an effect in reducing the health hazard from smoking." Risks increase the longer and more one smokes, and decline if smoking is stopped.

It was also found that cigar and pipe smoking have little significance in the national death rate, in comparison with cigarets, but that pipe smoking PARTIAL TEX'

appears to cause lip cancer. "Higher Death Rate"

The report said that the conclusions were based not simply on statistical indications, but on "many lines of converging evidence."





Makes No Tests

Its essential conclusion stated: "Cigaret smoking is a health hazard of sufficient importance in the United States to warrant appropriate remedial action." The committee's work cov-

ered all available published and unpublished research data, including more than 8,000 medical studies, but did not undertake independent experimentation or testing.

It was described by Terry as "the most comprehensive comnilation and analysis ever undertaken on the relationship between smoking and health."

U. S. Selling Report

The committee was not instructed to recommend action. Terry said that the public health service, in coöperation with other government agencies and private groups will "move promptly to determine what

A. Background and Highlights

In previous studies, the use of tobacco, especially cigaret smoking, has been causally linked to several diseases. Such use has been associated with

increased deaths from lung cancer and other diseases, notably coronary artery disease,

chronic bronchitis, and emphysema. These widely reported find-

ings, which have been the cause of much public concern over the past decade, have been accepted in many countries by official health agencies, medical associations, and voluntary health organizations.

Presents One Aspect The potential hazard is great because these diseases are ma-

jor causes of death and disability. In 1962, over 500,000 people in the United States died of arteriosclerotic heart disease,

principally coronary artery disease; 41,000 died of lung cancer, and 15,000 died of bronchttis and emphysema. The numbers of deaths in

Further evidence of Communism in the violence was seen in the unamimous reaction of the Red press in Moscow and around the world. Communist newspapers accused the United States of aggression, branding American troops murderers and ignoring American casualties.

The violence was precipitated by students. Communist groups are known to center their attentions on universities in Latin America and elsewhere.

It was considered significant here that while Panamanian government broadcasts were urging the people to resume their peaceful ways, broadcasts urging continuance of violence were reportedly coming from a university station in Panama.

Day-Long Search Is Fruitless

The fate of a River Forest Insurance executive and five members of his family, missing since Friday night on a flight to Michigan, remained unknown last night after a fruitless daylong search in northern Michigan. One hundred persons joined in the hunt.

Intermittent snow hampered 13 planes which flew over a three-county area in search of Harold J. Cummings Jr., 36, of 919 Monroe av., River Forest; his wife, Patricia, 32; and four of their six children. Authorities lost radio contact with Cummings at 6:43 p. m. Friday when he reported that he could not locate the landing strip at the Boyne mountain ski resort near Petoskey on the northern sula.

Planned Skling Week-end The Cummings family planned to join friends at the resort for

a week-end of skiing. Several planes combed the area after darkness last night in Sheriff Studies Several planes combed the search of small fires, but with-

out success. The area being searched is heavily wooded, mainly with pines, and is covered with 25 inches of snow. Authorities say that the Cummings family could have survived a plane crash if they landed in the cushiony snow or a forest. They said the extreme cold temperature makes it urgent that search parties find the family as soon as possible.

He's An Insurance Executive

Cummings is the general agent for the Minnesota Mutual Life Insurance company in the Chicago area. His father, Harold Sr., of St. Paul, is president of the company.

The elder Cummings said his son is a native of St. Paul and was graduated from Marquette university in Milwaukee. He has been a resident of the Chicago 83 RELATIVES area for 10 years and worked for Allstate Insurance company before joining his father's firm four years ago,

Cummings is a licensed pilot and has been flying rented or chartered planes for a year. He moved his family into the River Forest home two years ago.

Each Is Considered

Each of these three lines of evidence was evaluated and then considered together in drawing conclusions. The committee was aware that the mere establishment of a statistical association between the use of tobacco and a disease is not enough. The causal significance of the use of tobacco in relation to the disease is the crucial question. For such judgments all three lines of evidence are essential. . .

In the paragraphs which follow, the committee has chosen to summarize the results of the seven prospective population studies which as noted above, constitute only one type of evidence. They illustrate the na-ture and potential magnitude of the smoking-health problem, and bring out a number of factors which are involved.

EVIDENCE FROM THE COMBINED RESULTS OF PROSPECTIVE STUDIES

The committee examined the seven prospective studies separately as well as their combined results. Considerable weight was attached to the consistency of findings among the several studies. However, to simplify presentation, only the combined results are highlighted here.


Of the 1,123,000 men who entered the seven prospective studies and who provided usable histories of smoking habits [and other characteristics such as age], 37,391 men died during the subsequent months or years of the studies. No analyses of data for females from prospective studies are presently available.

To permit ready comparison of the mortality experience of smokers and nonsmokers, two concepts are widely used in the studies--excess deaths of smokers compared with nonsmokers, and mortality ratio. After adjustments for differences in age and the number of cigaret smokers and nonsmokers, an expected number of deaths of smokers is derived on the basis of deaths among nonsmokers. Excess deaths are thus the number of actual observed deaths among smokers in excess of the number expected. The mortality ratio . . . measures the relative death rates of smokers and nonsmokers. If the age-adjustment death rates are the same, the mortality ratio will be 1.0; if the death rates of smokers are double those of nonsmokers, the mortality ratio will be 2.0. Expressed as a percentage, the example would be equivalent to a 100 per cent increase.

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

THE EFFECTS OF SMOKING; PRINCIPAL FINDINGS

Cigaret smoking is associated with a 70 per cent increase in the age-specific death rates of males, and to a lesser extent with increased death rates of females. The total number of excess deaths causally related to cigaret smoking in the United States population cannot be accurately estimated. In view of the continuing and mounting evidence from many sources, it is the judgment of the committee that cigaret smoking contributes substantially to mortality from certain specific diseases and to the over-all death rate,



The mortality ratio was increased as the number of years of smoking increased.

In two studies which recorded the degree of inhalation, the mortality ratio for a given amount of smoking was greater for inhalers than for noninhalers. Cigaret smokers who had stopped smoking prior to enrollment in the study had mortality ratios of about 1.4 as against

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


PSYCHO-SOCIAL ASPECTS OF SMOKING

A clear-cut smoker's personality has not emerged from the results so far published. While smokers differ from nonsmokers in a variety of characteristics, none of the studies has shown a single variable which is found solely in one group and is completely absent in another. Nor has any single variable been verified in a sufficiently large proportion of

smokers and in sufficiently few nonsmokers to consider it an 'essential" aspect of smoking. The overwhelming evidence points to the conclusion that

smoking-its beginning, habituation, and occasional discontinuation-is to a large extent psychologically and socially determined. This does not rule out physiological factors, espe-

cially in respect to habituation


