BRONX. Eight people were hospitalized yesterday after a suspicious blaze tore through a two-story building in the West Farms section of the Bronx. Firefighters rescued a twoyear-old boy and a 20-yearold mother who were found unconscious. The child was in serious condition and his mother and three other adults were in critical condition after the 6 a.m. fire. One firefighter was also seriously injured. NEW YORK. A man claiming to be an accomplished French-language TV journalist, initially charged with rape, trespass and harassment involving a July incident with a Russian tourist in Riverside Park, was indicted vesterday on various sex crimes charges against five more women, according to reports. ## Man shoots would-be burglar All lit up and nowhere to go

Mayor tells smokers to butt out of parks, beaches and pedestrian plazas O 'They'll come after us in our homes, just watch,' one smoker fumes



Smokers will be barred from most of Times Square, all of Central Park and Coney Island's boardwalk and beach under Mayor Michael Bloomberg's plan to extend the smoking ban to the city's 1,700 parks, 14 miles of public beaches and public plazas.

"All of the science keeps saying again and again that second-hand smoke is not quite as bad as if you smoked yourself, but it is

bad enough," he said.
Bloomberg's 2003 barsmoking and-restaurant ban may have reduced the number of smokers here by 350,000, but health officials say nonsmoking New Yorkers are well above the national average in terms of having elevated levels of nicotine byproducts from second-hand smoke (57 percent compared to 45 per-

The City Council is expected to introduce legislation today to give NYPD and parks enforcement the power to slap smokers with quality-of-life sum-mons of roughly \$50. But Council Speaker Christine

Quinn envisions citizens as the first line. "This is largely going to be enforced by New Yorkers talking politely and in a dignified way to other New Yorkers," she said.

"I don't mind it, really. I hate smoking around peo-ple" said pack-a-day smoker and Manhattan lawyer Brian Fredericks, 31. "But it is a slippery slope. A lot of things are harmful.

Someone 3ft sitting within three feet of a smoker outdoors is exposed to similar levels of indoor second-hand smoke, health officials said.

### **Worries** that government going too far

New York is actually following the lead of Chicago and Los Angeles, which implemented similar bans three years ago. Some smokers said they were sympathetic to the plight of nonsmokers, but many complained about increasing government interference.

"I pay my taxes and deserve my liberties," said David Cruz, 51, a copier technician who

smokes one and a half packs a day. "They're try-ing to force us to quit with these bans and the taxes. If we want to smoke it should be up to us. ... All these little laws, I've had it. I'm going to retire myself to Florida." **METRO/AZ** 

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
