## The Growth and Progress of our Business.

THAT the reader may have an intelligent idea of the growth and progress of our business during the past eighteen years, we will state that our sales of plug tobacco in 1878 were 1,757,884 pounds, and that the United States Internal Revenue Tax Collector's returns since that date will show that the increase has been material and steady, and that it reached the enormous annual output of 27,530,680 pounds of plug tobacco, which does not include the number of pounds of tobacco sold by us to be made up into smoking tobacco or that used by us in the manufacture of cigarettes. This steady growth of our business in plug tobacco has made it necessary for us to increase our manufacturing facilities, and to do this we purchased, about a year ago, 20½ acres of ground favorably located in the southwest part of St. Louis, accessible to all of the railway lines entering the city, and proceeded to erect thereon the largest tobacco plant in the world. The reader will have some idea of its magnitude when we state that the plant has a total frontage of nearly one mile—the buildings being in two rows separated by three lines of railway tracks belonging to this company, which gives unsurpassed facilities for receiving and handling raw materials and for shipping the manufactured product. The plant will not only consist of plug and cigarette factories, but will embrace a large licorice factory, where the licorice used in the manufacture of our plug tobacco will be

made, thus insuring at all times a high grade and absolutely pure article. All of the boxes used by the company will also be made on the premises, in buildings equipped with the best modern machinery. The power to drive the machinery in the entire plant will be furnished by immense dynamos located in power house which occupies a central position in the group of buildings. These dynamos will also furnish electricity for lighting the entire works whenever artificial light is required. Our receiving and shipping facilities will be such that train loads of raw material can be unloaded directly into the warehouses and factories of the plant, and the outgoing manufactured product loaded on railway cars and shipped by us to every point in the United States without the use of dray or wagon.

Aside from the unsurpassed shipping facilities, the plant is so situated as to make it of easy access, via several electric and steam car lines, to the thousands of employees residing in various sections of the city and in the suburban towns, and consequently is admirably located in every way. The Missouri Pacific system and also the St. Louis & San Francisco line have passenger stations on the grounds.

## To Our Readers.

WE wish to call your attention for a few minutes to the newest and best of cigarettes—Crimps. As the name indicates, the laps on these cigarettes are secured by crimping. The lap is only  $\frac{1}{2}$  of an inch in width, and looks very much like the seam made by a sewing machine. As this crimped lap is very narrow, there is consequently much less paper to each cigarette, and as there is no nasty paste or glue used in their manufacture, the two most objectionable features to cigarettes are entirely removed.

Crimps are made from the finest grades of Virginia and Carolina leaf, most carefully manipulated, and we do not hesitate to guarantee them the best of all.

While no pains or expense has been spared in perfecting the cigarette, the package also has received its share of attention and is indeed a work of art. Lithographed after the style of an English master, it is the richest and yet the neatest box that can be made.
