

Conference Purpose and Objectives

This conference has been developed to provide an up-to-date presentation of strategies for designing, conducting, and evaluating community-based health promotion and disease prevention programs for tobacco control.

The conference will highlight the scientific basis for tobacco control, practical aspects of developing different tobacco control programs, effective tobacco control campaigns, and the role of the tobacco industry in promoting tobacco use throughout the world.

The conference has been designed to meet the needs of all health profes-

sionals interested in community tobacco control, including health educators, physicians, health counselors, nurses, public health professionals, voluntary health organization staff, and private health program administrators.

Special Objectives

At the conclusion of the conference the participant should better understand how to:

- develop and implement interventions for different populations;
- develop interventions for schools, communities, worksites and medical practices;

- use the media to fight the tobacco industry's efforts to recruit children, women, people of color and the poor;
- assess the value of pharmacological treatments, and the application of behavioral science in the development of smoking cessation programs;
- counter the growing problem of tobacco use in developing nations.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Conference Registration

A registration fee of \$220.00 will be charged for all conference participants. This includes tuition, conference materials, opening night reception and banquet dinner and all refreshment breaks. Registration fees must be paid at the time of application.

For those attending the conference, but not staying on the Stanford campus (see Housing Accommodations), commuter lunches for Wednesday and Thursday are available for a total of \$31.50.

Cancellation Policy

If written cancellation is received before June 30, a refund, less a \$20.00 processing fee, will be made. No refunds will be allowed after June 30.

Accreditation

Continuing Medical Education

The Postgraduate Medical Education Program at Stanford University School of Medicine is fully accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME).

This course is acceptable for Category 1 credit in the California Medical Association's Certificate in Continuing Education program for physicians.

Housing Accommodations

It is recommended that conference registrants stay on the Stanford campus. Location of this housing makes convenient full participation in conference activities including early morning supervised exercise sessions, healthy meal plans, conference reception and round table discussions.

Room and board (3 meals/day) is available for the conference in University student residences at a package rate of \$170.00 single-room occupancy and \$149.50 per person double occupancy for the entire conference (from the evening meal of Tuesday, July 24, through lunch of Thursday, July 26). Children 10 and under are charged half rate of the room/board package. No refunds will be given for meals or nights missed.

Personal checks and cash accepted. No foreign checks and no credit cards accepted.

A \$40.00 key deposit is required. A parking fee of \$1.50 per car per day will be charged.

Dormatories are clean but spartan. Rooms are without phones and the baths are shared (towels and sheets are provided). University facilities such as libraries and recreational areas are available. Separate fees are charged for golf and swimming.

Check-in time is after 8:00 a.m., July 24 and check-out time is no later than 1:00 p.m., July 26. The housing office is open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you plan on arriving later than 10 p.m., it is important that you let us know your arrival time. Early or extended stay using campus housing may be arranged at special request. The daily rate is \$36.50 for a single room and \$26.25 per person for a shared room (meals not included).

Off-campus motel/hotel accommodations are available near the Stanford University campus ranging in price from \$50.00 to \$135.00 per night. A list of local hotels and motels will be provided upon request to the Conference Coordinator.




